REVD GAIL WRITES...



When I talk to nursery school children about Remembrance I teach them this little song...

'In November, we remember, all the good things that God gives, so that nothing is forgotten and our special memories live'.

It has actions too, ask me to teach you when you see me around the village. But why mention this song here? For me, it's simplicity it holds much depth. It holds the importance of remembering, whether this be 'remember, remember, the 5th of November' or our loved ones who have died at All Saints and All Soul'sor the national day of remembering those who have died during conflict.

Remembering can be painful and traumatic, but it can also be beautiful. We can remember 'the good old days' with joyful nostalgia but also recognising all that we have lost. Remembering plays an important role who we understand ourselves in relationship with other, our community and with the world. Remembering is also deeply important to God.

Remembrance runs throughout the bible, not as an act that is passive but rather as something we do in action. Remembrance in ancient Greek (the language the New Testament of the bible is written in) is linked to the same root word used in the word resurrection. Like resurrection, remembrance should lead us to not focus on impossibility but instead focus on the God who does the impossible. Our remembrance should lead to a new and deep sense of hope.

God wants us to live in hope, to be a people of remembrance who

through God and God's remembering of us, are re-membered as a whole people. People living as one, not people divided. The bible calls this The Body of Christ.

As our little song says, remembrance is about life, us holding the whole of life, the past, the present and the future. Remembering in lament, in thankfulness, in hope and in praise all that has gone before us in the hope of a future where all life and creation flourishes in its fullness of being.

In this issue of Grapevine you will find lots more information about the life of St Laurence Church and The Ark. We also have more information about our services over the Christmas period. Please do make a note of the dates knowing that you are very welcome to come and join us where you can.

with Mark Linton

Tell us about yourself.

I'm Mark and married to Sarah. We live in Redditch, but Sarah used to live in Alvechurch and worshipped at St Laurence. After marrying we returned to St Laurence to worship and for Sarah to help with the Toddlers and Children's groups. We have a blended family with 6 children between us. They are all grown up, married, and finding their own way in the world. We are very fortunate to have 9 grandchildren who keep us on our toes as well.

Where might we find you every day, and what sort of things would you be doing or being?

I work for Jaguar Land Rover as an Engineering Manager looking after a team of 15 Engineers. I have recently suffered with health issues and so am off work awaiting open heart surgery. So, my normal everyday has changed dramatically in the last 8 weeks!

How do you experience God in the joys and challenges of everyday life?

I try to live my life as a follower of Jesus, with him as the centre of my life. Being an Engineer I am interested in how things work. My current health issues mean that I need to understand how the human body works to appreciate my limitations in everyday living. The body is so intricate that I can't help but look at it and see God's design. Now being at home all day is a challenge especially waiting for appointments and test results. So, I try to see God in all things even the timing of each appointment.

How do you share your faith with others in everyday life?

At work and at home I see my faith as a part of me. I don't hide that I go to church and that I am a Christian. When appropriate, my faith might come into conversations, but otherwise I believe that my actions speak louder than my words. I find people respect this, as they know I not only respect them, but I will always be true and honest with them.

(How) Does your faith grow through everyday living?

I try to spend some quiet time each day to read the bible and pray. I am not perfect and sometimes miss a day or two! Through reading Christian books, the bible and listening to Christian music I feel a closeness with God. I sense that he is there, standing with me through issues at work or when I have poor health.

St Laurence's desire is to be a church for the whole community. Through being a Christ like presence to all we meet in this place, we worship and proclaim the love and hope of God. How does your everyday faith support that desire?

I believe my actions speak louder than my words, I agree that St Laurence church should be at the heart of the community. Supporting people, as we move from the Covid pandemic into the cost-of-living crisis is important.

"Ministry" is what all believers are called to, not just for those ordained. How can we support you in yours?

In August we started a men's study group at St Laurence. It's for guys to come together to talk about everyday issues and to have support when times are tough. The men's study group is open to all and for those who cannot make it regularly we plan a social event soon.

How can we pray for you?

I have been a Christian for many years. I still though sometimes need reminding of how Great God is. No matter what I am going through in life he has got hold of me. So, I would value your prayers that I can support others and always remember, that we have an amazing God.

An Angel of Love

In the southeast corner of St Laurence's churchyard there are several graves where still-born or neo-natal babies are buried.

Some of these graves are unmarked.

They date back to the days when such infants were not offered a "proper" funeral.

The children involved are all but forgotten by the community. Remembered only by their parents and families.

This aberration has long been a source of sorrow for members of St Laurence and this year we have been able to do something about it. An on-going project has

been started to go some way to right the wrong of the past. The work is being funded by specific donations from members of the church and local community. The undergrowth has been cleared away from the graves and the overhanging tree branches will shortly be cut back,

A memorial stone is being donated by A Pullen Memorials to be installed by the

graves. We thank Pullen's for this generous donation.

Just by this area there used to be a magnificent cherry tree which delighted the eyes every spring with its blossom. Sadly that lost a great limb in a storm a few years back and the stump has been sitting waiting for someone to think what to do with it.

ALVECHURCH REMEMBERS



Sunday 13th November

St Laurence Church at 10am and at the Memorial Green from 10.30am.

St Laurence Church, Alvechurch Parish Council and the Alvechurch Services Association have come together to plan a service for Remembrance Sunday.

Representatives from our community have been invited to take part as Alvechurch Remembers together.

Please note that Bear Hill will be closed to traffic up to Snake Lane between 10.15am - 11.30am

On 11th November there will be no formal Act of Remembrance at Memorial Green, although you may wish to gather for a time of quiet reflection.

On Remembrance Sunday all our war graves will be mark by red balloons, this will help you to identify them more easily.

After the service in St Laurence Church as we process down to Memorial Green children from Alvechurch Middle School will lay a remembrance cross on each grave.

At the going down of the sun and in the morning We will remember them

BURIED CLOSE TO HOME

Service men who died as a result of World War 1 or 2 and who are buried in war graves in St Laurence churchyard are remembered in November by the placing of poppy crosses on their graves.

It was decided that bodies of men who died abroad would not be repatriated and that all should be treated in the same way regardless of rank and have the same white headstone of Portland stone. This also applied to the many men who died in the UK from wounds or illness resulting from service abroad or those who served at home having been found to be unfit for foreign service.

There are seven war graves in the churchyard, three from World War 1 and four from World War 2. Six are the traditional Portland stone Commonwealth War graves, the seventh was a family grave and a CWGC stone was added at the foot in 2016.

World War 1

Two graves in area of churchyard to left of drive

Thomas Davis Private, Labour Corps. Son of Thomas and Elizabeth Davis, of Birmingham Road, Alvechurch. Died from bronchitis and pneumonia aged 35 on 18th November 1918 at Cliveden Hospital,

Taplow, buried on 23rd November 1918. Thomas had done war work at the Birmingham Gas Company and on the land; before enlisting he was a highly respected member of the church choir.

Thomas Trueman Private, Labour Corps. Son of William and Mary Trueman, of Withybed Green, Alvechurch; husband of Edith Trueman, 27 Mill Lane, Northfield, Birmingham. Died aged 37 on 28th December 1918 at Sobraon Military Hospital, Colchester, buried on 4th January 1919.



Roland Matthews (Grave near base of tower and Ark door) Private, 13th Battalion Australian Infantry Australian Imperial Force.

Son of Richard and Mary Ann Matthews, of Poolbank, Cofton, Northfield, Birmingham, born at Alvechurch. Died of wounds on 2nd January 1918 in the Tankerton Military Hospital, Whitstable, Kent, aged 27. Buried on 8th January 1918.

Roland had emigrated to Australia but the consequences of war saw him return to England, buried next to his family.

World War 2 -Three graves in West churchyard to left of the turning circle.

Harry Busby Private, 1st Battalion Worcestershire Regiment. Son of Henry and Margaret Busby, of Barnt Green, Worcestershire. A despatch rider, he died in hospital in Kent aged 21 on 13th May 1944 following an accident.

William Price Company Quartermaster Sergeant, 8th Battalion North Staffordshire Regiment. Died on 11th October 1941.

Alfred Reading Ordinary Seaman, H.M.S. Argus Royal Navy. Son of John and Ellen Reading of Alvechurch and husband of Millicent Amelia Daisy Reading, of Alvechurch. Died aged 35 on 10th June 1947.

William Keeling (Family grave near the wooden fence dividing churchyard from The Lawns – CWGC Portland stone added). Lance Corporal, Royal Army Service Corps. Husband of J. Keeling, of Alvechurch. Died on 23rd November 1940 in Ireland. CWGC stone was added at the foot in 2016.

After the war it was decided to bring an unidentified body from France which could serve as a symbol for the families whose loved ones were buried abroad or who had no known graves and were simply listed on one of the huge memorials to the missing such as Thiepval or Tyne Cot. Lieutenant-Colonel Edward Anthony Gell M.C., the son of a one-time rector of Alvechurch Francis Gell, was Deputy of the then Imperial War Graves Commission and assisted with the process of selection of this Unknown Warrior. The chosen body was returned to England and was buried in Westminster Abbey on 11 November 1920 when thousands of people lined the streets to see it pass.

St Laurence Church, War Memorial

The wooden screen war memorial in St. Laurence Church was designed by Arthur Stansfield Dixon (1856-1929).

Dixon was the eldest son of Birmingham M.P. George Dixon and was a metal worker and architect, founded the Birmingham Guild of Handicraft and designed their HQ in Great Charles Street. He also designed St. Andrew's Church in Barnt Green, but not their war memorial which is by the Bromsgrove Guild, and the church of St. John and St. Basil now the base for the St. Basil's charity. In 1917 he designed Seoul Anglican Cathedral in Korea, this was started in 1922 but not completed until 1996 after the original plans had been discovered. His son James who was in the Royal Warwickshire's was killed in 1916 and Dixon designed the Regiment's memorial in St. Philip's Cathedral in Birmingham.

The Alvechurch Memorial was given by Alfred and Margaret Wiggin of Bordesley Hall in thanks for the safe return of their son William. A service of dedication of the "Memorial Screen" was held on 3rd October 1920 as part of the morning service. The names of those listed on the memorial were read followed by last post and reveille. The recessional hymn was "God of our fathers, known of old" written by Rudyard Kipling who had also lost a son in the conflict.

This hymn was originally a poem called "Recessional" written by Kipling to mark Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee in 1897. Four of the five verses end with the line "Lest we forget – lest we forget", lines which later came to be

very much associated with remembering the fallen of World War 1. The hymn is sung on Anzac Day in Australia to the tune of "Eternal father strong to save" and was also sung at Kipling's funeral in 1936. Kipling was involved with the Imperial (later Commonwealth) War Graves Commission and selected the phrases "Their name Liveth for Evermore" and "Known Unto God" used in the



cemeteries as well as "The Glorious Dead" on the Cenotaph in London.





How do you remember tasks, events, or people?? Some of us have a good memory and don't forget. Others need ways to remember. Many of us use a diary, a phone or fridge door calendar.



Visiting Lindisfarne Castle recently, we found a way some people remember. We walked round the shoreline and found a pile of stones built one on another - a cairn. It was not alone - there were over a hundred – a lot of memories!



Cairns are a way for people to remember an event or loved ones who have died. They go back beyond Old Testament times. In the story of the people of Israel crossing the red sea, God pushed back the water and they crossed on dry land. God told their leader Joshua to collect 12 stones from the riverbed and build a cairn. People asking why it was built were told it was a visible reminder of God's promise to love and look after his people.


Recently our media outlets have helped us remember Queen Elizabeth 2nd. We may remember her service and faith or perhaps her Jubilees or even Coronation. We may not have built cairns for her but the queue to view her coffin conveyed the desire to remember her.

In November we remember our uniformed personnel. Many have served, at great personal cost, and some paid the ultimate price. On 11/11 we remember, giving thanks for them and the freedoms they have bought us.

How does Christian faith help us think about faith?
This conversation between Jesus and a thief as they were both dying on a cross gives us a clue: -

Then the thief said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." Jesus answered him, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in paradise.

We can be sure Jesus will always remember us whatever our remembering is like. I pray God grants you ways to remember His wonderful love for you and what Jesus sacrificed for us. We'd be delighted to explore that with you in church or maybe in a conversation? Do remember to get in touch....



News from the Tower

I had an interesting question in the week - "Why do you always ring the same tune?". The truth is that it's not always the same tune but we are very restricted in what we can do.


The problem is that we ring the bells by swinging them through a full circle and the bell can only sound once during that swing. We get a "ding" as the bell swings one way and we get a "dong" as it swings back a second or so later. With each of our bells weighing up to half a tonne there's not a lot that a ringer can do change the rhythm.

This severely restricts our choice of music. There's not a chance of getting a run of semiquavers out of a bell - it just can't move that quickly. The only tunes we can manage are slow ones where all the notes are the same length, and all the notes are different. "Pop Goes the Weasel" and "The Archers'" theme are two (utterly inappropriate) possibilities.

What we ring are "Methods". They're mathematical patterns rather than music but they're none the worse for that; maths and music have always been closely linked.
