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Hands up anyone who has ever read a scandalous story about someone and thought "at least I'm not as bad as" followed by a little glow of self- satisfaction. Yes, me too. With today's ease of communication, it is all too simple to act on thoughts like this. Look how everyone jumped on the band wagon when Cliff Richard was suspected of abuse. He was tried and condemned by the media before any facts were known and his life very nearly ruined. Many other innocent people have suffered too, both those in the public eye and ordinary people.

Why do we, as human beings, seem to need to judge each other all the time? Is it somehow to assure ourselves that we are not so bad really...? Most, if not all faith groups recognize this tendency to speak negative thoughts and Buddhists work with four speech precepts:

- 1. Avoid false speech, making truthfulness the centre of their conversation.
- 2. Abstaining from harsh speech, practising kindness in the way they use words.
- 3. Avoiding frivolous speech curt quips that can hurt others.
- 4. Avoiding disharmonious speech, using communication to bring people together rather than drive them apart.

I particularly like that last one.

The good news is that we don't need to knock others down to make ourselves feel better. All we need to do is to look for reassurance to God, who loves us with the sort of passion and pride that good parents

feel when their child stumbles, falls and gets up again, at whatever stage of life! God doesn't demand perfection from us, only that we try to follow his ways of love. Jesus came to show us the way to love each other. He constantly forgave others. He even forgave those who crucified him "Father forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." Luke 23 v14. Even in the worst agony possible, his thoughts were with others and not in a judgmental way, but utterly loving and understanding what had led them to act as they did. Confronted with that kind of love, how can we judge someone who has hurt us or others. It not only harms them, if we act on that judgment, but harms us as well as we become less loving and kind, which only makes us judge ourselves more harshly, so we have to blame others and so the cycle continues.

Let's let Jesus break this cycle. As St. Paul says in Ephesians chapter 2, "Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other just as in Christ, God forgave you."

I carry on my key ring a little disc that simply says "forgiven". If we, who constantly fail and let God down, are forgiven and loved, then that love can and simply must flow out from us to bless others.

Perhaps we can make sure our children know that they are loved by a God whose opinion is of far more worth than the number or lack of likes they receive on their phones and the inevitable bullying that seems part of growing up. If they can give others love and support, God will bless their efforts and that love will flow back to bless them in a good cycle.

Thank you Jesus for not judging me!

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

With the help of the Clewer Initiative, we've been looking in this diocese at how we can help combat modern slavery. Recently Doug Chaplin met Jared and Helen Hodgson, of Bromsgrove, who've founded a charity to help churches and Christian volunteers offer support to freed slaves. This is what they say about their work:

"We became aware that modern slavery still existed on a family trip to India. On our return, we discovered that slavery is rife in the UK and survivors are often left destitute and open to being re-trafficked. We decided that, like William Wilberforce, we couldn't 'look away' so opened up our home to survivors thus beginning the small seed of **Hope at Home**.

"Several years later, Hope at Home now provides a hosting scheme across the UK for survivors unable to access other housing. We train support hosts and arrange placements for survivors. Our hosts offer a stable home, giving the opportunity to breathe out and focus on recovery. We also work alongside professional agencies able to provide long term support."

John Butterworth: "The Nurse Who Changed Guinea-Bissau"

In 1957 freshly qualified nurse and missionary Lily Gaynor set sail for Guinea-Bissau, to live among the Papel tribe. Illness was rife, and children were malnourished. Witch doctors flourished. Lily set up a clinic under the mango trees, administering penicillin through 'God's needle'. In the evenings she translated the entire New Testament into the local language, in the face of considerable opposition. Today Guinea-Bissau has one of the biggest national churches in West Africa.

Monday 5th November

Ray Sturdy: "The Home Guard: the real Dad's Army".

Was it all really all like the TV comedy series? Ray will present true memories of our wartime Home Guard. As working civilians they had an eventful time training to protect Britain from an unknown future.

National Adoption week runs from 16 - 22 October

Adoption Sunday is an opportunity each year for the Church to share the good news of our adoption into God's family and to respond to the needs of children and young people in the UK care system. Home for Good has a voice into 10 churches in Worcestershire. Could you be next? All Saints' in Worcester is hosting an Adoption Sunday service on 28 October.

At Home for Good, our vision is a home for every child who needs one. We want every child to have a stable, loving home where they can thrive. We know that for children in care, it's crucial to find the right placement at the right time - whether that's a short-term foster placement in an emergency, a long-term foster placement or a new adoptive family. Currently, this isn't always possible. In the UK there is an urgent need for more than 7,000 foster families and there are not enough people coming forward to adopt children who wait the longest for adoption - children over the age of four, with additional needs, from black and minority ethnic communities and who are part of a sibling group.

We believe the Church is well-placed to ensure that every child has the home they need and that families that foster or adopt receive the support that they need. So, the invitation to be involved in Home for Good through the local church is one we must accept. All Christians are adopted, and the Church must bear witness to this new family. Let's offer an extraordinary, radical alternative family where all are welcome by God's invitation.



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



Letter from the Bishop of Dudley



The hymn 'Dear Lord and Father of mankind' is a favourite of many. I love the calming sense of the hymn as it progresses from verse to verse. The third verse speaks of the Sabbath rest by Galilee, recalling Jesus taking himself off into the hills in prayer to enter into communion with his Father in "the silence of eternity interpreted by love".

Within Judaism, as we see from many stories in the gospels, the Sabbath has a central place in the rhythm of the week and in the makeup of life. In fact, it has a central place in the Ten Commandments, as the commandment to keep the seventh day unlike all other days is found between those commandments that talk about people's relationship with God and those that speak about relationships with other human beings. This Sabbath commandment, then, is the hinge point. It brings together God and the human world, the loving of God and loving of neighbour, in a unique way.

The Sabbath day is a place-marking gift. A day on which to stop toiling and to rest. It is also a day of joy to unwrap again all of the blessings we have been given and to be re-thankful for them. Rest and joy lead into freedom and we read of the sabbatical year when land is allowed to breath, debts are cancelled, and slaves are released from that which binds them. In turn, this leads back to rest and joy.

In our own lives, there are various rhythms that are played out. We find we need to snatch periods of Sabbath time amidst pressing other responsibilities. Carers speak of the crucial need for rest, and whilst respite care often carries a sense of guilt, it allows the carer to go on caring. After a

traumatic or difficult period, we begin to see small signs of joy again and count our blessings. Freedom comes in many forms and I recall talking to a prisoner in HMP Hewell about his sense of freedom when he sang hymns of praise.

During the autumn, with the agreement of Bishop John and the support of the Archdeacons, I will be on sabbatical. I hope this extended Sabbath time will offer some rest which, to my mind, isn't loafing but is about doing things that bring me spiritual, intellectual and physical replenishment. I'm going to spend time writing which always brings me much joy. Freedom will come from having a break from some of the ministerial responsibilities which come with my role!

I am hoping to learn more about Orthodox Christianity which will resource my involvement with the International Commission for Anglican Orthodox Theological Dialogue. I will be spending time on pilgrimage to Mount Athos in Greece and taking part in a week-long painting retreat at the Bethlehem Icon School. In both places, as well as in the creativity of writing, I hope to encounter the silence of eternity interpreted by love.

I am delighted that sabbaticals are taken seriously in this Diocese and hope that the fact that I am taking one will encourage other clergy, who have not done so for seven years or more, to consider doing so. Do encourage them! My one previous experience of a sabbatical was personally very enriching and parishioners were kind enough to say that it was, in turn, beneficial for them - though they lacked clarity whether that was during or after the sabbatical!

I'm enormously grateful for this gift, and especially the generosity of colleagues in making it possible, so that I can go deeper into Sabbath life at the hinge point of serving God and my neighbour.

Church Homeless Trust changes its name

Homelessness charity Church Housing Trust recently changed its name to Church Homeless Trust.

Church Homeless Trust's new name emphasises its focus on homeless individuals and the specific support they need to rebuild their lives. There is no government funding for individual needs such as new ID, stipends for transport, or living costs if someone's Universal Credit has been delayed. Without these items it is impossible to live independently.

People who have experienced homelessness also need more than a roof over their head; without the skills and sense of community needed to sustain a new tenancy, they may end up back on the streets. The Trust concentrates on building an individual's strengths and interests, and meeting their needs with small, personal grants.

The charity's origins go back to 1882 and the incredible work of Church Army Housing on behalf of homeless people. They worked at the forefront of homeless services, and Church Homeless Trust continues to support people in many hostels first set up by Church Army Housing.

Communications Manager, Nicole Holgate, comments: "The small change in our name helps to represent what we have learnt over more than 30 years' of providing funding for homeless people. We have seen a dramatic rise in demand for individual grants, especially for the funds we provide that help people to settle into their own, independent accommodation after being homeless.

"Everyone is an individual and their needs are as unique as they are. Only they can tell us what will help them make a permanent transition out of homelessness."

Gemma's story

Gemma lives at a residential rehabilitation treatment programme for addiction. She is in 'Stage Three' flats, the third and final stage of the hostel's recovery process.

Having been through the treatment programme, Gemma regularly volunteers in 'Stage One', where people begin their recovery from addiction and rough sleeping. She supports those beginning their recovery from addiction, and acts as an example of what can be achieved. She says she started volunteering because wants to give something back to the community and the service that changed her life.

However, to continue her role she needed ID, which was lost during her time on the street. Thanks to our donors, Church Homeless Trust was able to fund a replacement passport that Gemma can use to continue volunteering, apply for jobs, and find her own home in the future



Gemma had a successful interview to join another hostel's volunteer programme. She hopes it will lead into a paid trainee position and eventually a full-time, paid role.

Without grants from funding raised by Church Homeless Trust, Gemma and others like her will continue to be excluded from society. A small grant can make a huge difference.

Obituary for Eileen Grace Ross

1926 - 2018

Eileen was born in 1926 at Smedley Crook Place in Hopwood. The family then moved to Ham Green near Bentley and then to the newly built Batchley Estate in Redditch — first in Batchley Road and then in Cherry Tree Walk.

Whilst at Batchley in the 1940s Eileen and her family lived in fear of their lives each night, as the Nazi bombers were targeting the nearby factories of High Duty Alloys and Royal Enfield that were engaged in war work.

Eileen recalled how she could see Coventry burning, a big red glow in the sky for three nights, all the way from Redditch.

Eileen worked as a nurse at St Chad's Hospital on Hagley Road, Birmingham, as a shop assistant at Lewis's Department Store, and then at Scotts in Redditch.

It was while she was at Scotts in the early 1950s that she met her husband to be, Malcolm. He came into the shop in his Royal Navy officer's uniform and they got talking. As he left Eileen said to her work colleagues: "I've just been chatted up by a sailor with a beard!"


They were engaged within just one month of meeting each other and were married in 1957. They bought a house in Forge Mill Road, Redditch, and in 1961 their only son Iain was born. In 1967 the family moved to Callow Hill Road, Alvechurch, and Eileen got a job at Pretty's Bakery in The Square before retiring from her working life.

Eileen was an avid collector and soon became a well-known figure at local antique fairs. She soon began buying and selling and making money from what was originally just a hobby. She continued with this activity until well into her early 80s.

Eileen died peacefully in her sleep at home in Alvechurch on 11 May this year. She was 92. Her funeral, led by Revd Richard Bubbers at St Laurence church, was held on 6 June, after which her body was laid to rest in the churchyard.

Eileen was a determined fighter, as well as being a socialist, always down-to-earth and a realist.

She enjoyed life, and is greatly missed by those who knew and loved her.
