When words are not enough......

This is my last editorial for the Grapevine, as Sunday 4 July will be my

last Sunday as the Rector of St Laurence's.

After six and a half very full and happy years in Alvechurch I will be retiring from full-time ministry, and Sally and I will be moving to live in North Shropshire. We have both very much enjoyed living in Alvechurch: it is a special place in all sorts of ways, and we have learned so much and felt very settled here.

We are very grateful to everyone who has contributed to our time here - and to God for the opportunity to have been here. We will indeed miss Alvechurch and all those who have been part of our life here.

At a time like this, I am very aware that words are not enough. Perhaps you feel that sometimes too, not least when we are seeking to navigate through the uncharted waters of the pandemic.

I love words, and using language well, no doubt encouraged by my studying Latin and Greek at school and university and then becoming a litigation solicitor. But one of the things I have learnt during our time in Alvechurch is how often words are not enough, and there is the need to go beyond words. When we speak of God and the big mysteries of life (suffering, death, eternity...), all we can do is to use metaphors and pointers. Our language is not adequate fully to describe what is beyond our human understanding. In the Jewish tradition as a reminder of this, there is the practice of refusing even to pronounce the name of God. (It is worth noting that we get our word for mystery from the Greek word meaning "to hush or close the lips.").

The Bible encourages a delicate balance between knowing and not-knowing, between

using words and going beyond words into silence - having humility about words. I find it instructive to remember that the word "humility" comes from a Latin word for "ground/earth": in other words, to be humble is to be grounded, so that we have a firm place to stand.

Especially to get us started in life when we are young, we do need enough knowing. We need a container and structure in which we can safely acknowledge that we do know a bit – just enough to hold us until we are ready for a further knowing. Biblical faith is about the freedom not to know, not have answers for everything, to be able to combine a degree of knowing with a degree of not needing to know - knowing enough, so you can live with the not knowing.

Not only having words, concepts and images, but also being able to go beyond words and images into silence, come together in biblical faith. The ego may want certainty and total clarity, but there is healing to be found in the balance of these two streams of spirituality. It can save us from the danger of having a Christian ideology rather than a Christian faith.

The infinite One, who made everything that is, is actually beyond my human understanding. God is related to, rather than known. So, as the mystics tell us, we know God by loving God, by trusting God, by placing our hope in God. We cannot truly know God objectively like a set of facts to be possessed, but we may relate to God.

Jesus Christ came into the world as God's embodiment – God in human form – to show us what God is like: John's Gospel (1.1) describes Jesus as "the Word". Jesus' life, death and resurrection was and is God's invitation to be in relationship with the One who created and sustains you.

The Green Season

A letter from the Dean of Worcester, Peter Atkinson.

As we leave the season of Easter and Pentecost behind, the Church moves into the 'green' season of the weeks after Trinity. Green, because the vestments and altar frontals are of that colour, apart from the occasional variation when a festival or saint's day occurs. Green, too, because as we move from spring into summer, we are all the more aware of the greenery of trees and grass, hedgerows and hills. It's a good time of year for people with green fingers.

Green has other meanings as well. It stands for youth and inexperience ('he's very green'), reminding us of the green shoots of spring. Such people are sometimes called 'greenhorns', which is the American word for immature bulls or oxen. Less pleasantly, green is the colour of envy, derived from Shakespeare's 'green-eyed monster'. Older people can look with green-eyed jealousy at the greenhorns, who have all their life before them. The greenhorns are too green to know that the old can be envied as well as the young. To the envious person, old or young, the grass is always greener on the neighbour's side of the fence. All this suggests that we might spend the green season of the Church's year reflecting on what makes us envious, what makes us content, and trying to get the balance better.

And then, of course, the colour green has come to sum up the whole environmental agenda, from climate change to pollution, from waste to deforestation, from travel to sources of energy. One of the ways we can implement a green agenda is by living more simple lives, which brings us back to the idea of contentment, and learning to live without envy.

Soon after the start of June we celebrate the summer feast of St Wulfstan which is also the dedication festival of Worcester Cathedral (7 June). In the collect for St Wulfstan we pray that we may 'live simply, work diligently, and make God's kingdom known' — an agenda for the green season of the Church's year.



At the time this article goes to press, we are halfway through our challenge.

At the time of writing, we have raised £950 for Christian Aid and are so grateful that because of you, we have been able to help those struggling to live with the challenges of climate change and poverty.

Examples of how Christian Aid might use donations are:

£10 could buy a tap at a water point which will be installed at an earth dam, making it easier for people to fetch water.

£42 could buy 350kg of cement, which is needed for building work.

£335 could pay for a communal water point with two taps, situated at an earth dam, where people can collect water.

£545 could pay for a skilled labourer to work on the construction of an earth or sand dam.



Well it seems we really are in the process of being properly released. Is this how prisoners feel as they come to the end of their sentence? Of course, being human that question is nonsense, because even in similar circumstances we all experience totally different emotions. Some of us will erupt out of captivity this summer and resume what was once a normal life. Others will be more hesitant and some may feel so fearful and damaged by the last year's events that they remain trapped by fear, grief or addictions.

Jonah in the bible was so panicked by God asking him to travel to a new place to tell people, who didn't want to know God, the truth, that he ended up hiding in a whale! A bit drastic perhaps, but it is so tempting to hide away from anything that seems to threaten us. "What if"; two such intimidating words if used negatively - what if it all goes wrong.... but, how wonderful if used positively. What if God just loves us so extravagantly that he wants us to be free to be the people we were born to be. That kind of freedom is available whatever our circumstances – in lockdown or not, we can be free from fear, the dragging negativity of grief, the binding hold of unwanted habits or addictions.

God has made us wonderful promises to hang on to as we go out into the world again.

Deuteronomy 31.8 says "The Lord himself goes before you and will be with you; he will never leave you nor forsake you. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged".

John 16.33 says "I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world."

Exodus 14.14 says "The Lord will fight for you; you need only to be still."

I love that last one! In case anyone thinks I must know the bible extensively to be able to produce all these quotations, I have to admit I that I don't. The internet does much harm, but it is also full of wonderful encouragement. If anyone is in need of God's blessing in any way, you can just search along the lines of "Bible quotations for times of fear and despair" or "encouraging bible quotations" or "quotations expressing joy and gratitude". The bible is such a wonderful book, so rich in all human experience and emotion and so full of God's wonderful responses.

Always thinking at this time of those all over the world who are still in the midst of their struggles with Covid; may God pour his healing and grace on all those who feel overwhelmed. Amen.

Update on in-person services in church

- 2. 11:15 am 1st Sunday morning prayer (Common Worship) and on 2nd,3rd,4thand 5th Sundays communion service (Common Worship).

Safety restrictions at the time of going to print include our not being able to sing together. Two metre distancing means that we cannot fit in more than 31 people per service in the marked seats, but of course members of the same household/bubble are able to sit together and this will increase the maximum number who may be accommodated. Face coverings are also required, unless you come within one of the exempted groups, or while you are taking part in leading a service. At each service we need to ask for contact details for the government's "test and trace" scheme.



Alvechurch Open Gardens

Having been prevented from opening last year, Alvechurch Open Gardens are delighted to be able to invite visitors into their gardens this year. 11 Gardens ranging in size from a small courtyard garden to a 5 acre plot and including Alvechurch Allotments, are opening under the National Garden Scheme which raises money for charity. Appropriately the money mostly goes to support nursing and gardening charities, two areas that have become even more important to most of us over this time of pandemic. A list of beneficiaries for 2019 will be displayed at each garden.



Gardeners are working hard to get their gardens ready for the Open Days - Saturday 19th and Sunday 20th June. Gardens will be open from 1pm until 6pm with a combined price of £6.00. Accompanied children are free. Disability access is very restricted in most gardens as most have steps and/or slopes. No dogs except for assistance dogs or the garden owner's permission. Please be aware that some gardens are near to the river or canals and many have a pond. Deep water will be indicated but you will need to check children are kept safe.

The open days are just before the end of 'Lockdown' so we will need to observe social distancing. This won't be too difficult in the larger gardens and we hope visitors will be patient if they are asked to wait a few minutes before entering any of the smaller plots. This will help to ensure you have a better view as well as keeping you safe.

Tickets can be bought at any of the gardens with cash. Please try to have the exact money to avoid the risk of receiving change. If you don't want to handle cash, you can buy your ticket from a card machine at Wychwood House, Bear Hill. Tickets are valid for both days so you don't need to rush around in just one. A map of the gardens opening will be provided when you pay for your ticket. All gardens will be clearly indicated so you should be able to find them fairly easily.

If you are arriving by car, there is parking available in a field off Old Rectory Lane (not in use if we have had heavy rain!), the main central car park and at the train station, though the latter is a little distance from the gardens opening this year. There is also on-street parking on the wider roads. If you have taken to cycling during the pandemic, this is an ideal way of moving round the village. Don't forget to lock your bike when you leave it. Light refreshments will be provided at The Shrubbery which is a new venue for this. They will have a card machine to make paying easier and safer.

We hope many people will look forward to enjoying wandering around these many and varied gardens. The openers are eager to welcome you to share their treasured outside spaces and to make money for so many deserving charities. Please put 19th & 20th June in you diaries, we will be open come rain or shine though we hope for the latter!
