

A significant Birthday?

Each week the Family Service starts with celebration and thanksgiving – "The Birthday Slot". We celebrate someone's birthday or Wedding Anniversary, a baby's birth, exam results or gratitude for health. We sing a song, blow out a candle and give a card - the things families do on birthdays. Being thankful people and a grateful Church community is an important Christian witness. Gratitude to God for his free gift of grace is what drives us. It is a part of our worship as we give back to God in gratitude of our time, talents and money.

One of the questions in the Birthday Slot is — "is it a significant birthday?" (ie does it have a zero?). One senior worshipper when asked that question is known to reply "at my age they are all significant!"

We have recently seen a media focus on the 70th Birthday of our "National Religion" -the NHS. This got me thinking - is the NHS's birthday significant?

Certainly it has a 0 in it! It is also significant in achieving a "ripe old age" - sadly a number of its clients don't make that age. Would those who created the NHS and helped its complex birth (just like some babies today) have expected such longevity I wonder?

It is significant because we can give thanks to God for medicine based as it often has been on Christian principles. Like God's free gift of forgiveness and grace the NHS was free at the point of delivery and accessible to all. Like faith it isn't always seen that way now but still shares important foundations with faith. We can give thanks for advances in health medicine and truly amazing life saving developments.

70th birthdays are a significant time to look back from and also forwards. Currently there are many issues to cause the NHS problems with its own health. It seems always in crisis, overworked, understaffed and in our times of austerity expensive. The diagnosis of the NHS's state of health is relatively easy -the solutions are hard though there may be help coming. Some solutions acknowledge that, where we can, we need to look after ourselves better by adopting healthy lifestyles.

A 2008 report from the New Economics Foundation (Five Ways to Wellbeing: The Evidence -

http://neweconomics.org/2008/10/five-ways-to-wellbeing-the-evidence) gave five recommendations for preserving health and wellbeing which as Christians we can support:-

- Give its more blessed to give than receive!
- Be active exercise and mental activity
- Keep learning when did the Gospel last make you think?
- Connect to other people
- Take notice of things in life a flower, a baby's smile.

Whether we are of any faith or none, all these can help keep us physically and spiritually healthy. Perhaps you'd like to consider giving in some way – perhaps through church or connecting to your community as part of St Laurence's family? Happy Birthday NHS!

ST LAURENCE CHURCHYARD – NEEDS YOUR HELP

In the past, St Laurence has been lucky to have a team of volunteers to maintain large parts of the churchyard. From a team of 6 a few years ago, the number has fallen due to health issues and family commitments. This year the team of just 3 people has been doing the job, with only one of them able to use the ride-on mower and strimmers. That's put a lot of pressure on us and visitors will have noticed the grass growing particularly long in May and June. Some people like the natural look of a churchyard with long grass and wild flowers but a number of families did contact the church during that period to say how untidy they think it looked. At St Laurence we try to balance tidiness with natural areas but we're sorry if you felt the churchyard looked a little uncared for. In 2018 this has been a result of not enough volunteers rather than bad weather.

Can you help us? We're looking for a couple of extra pairs of hands, particularly someone able to handle the ride-on mower and/or strimmers. If you've never used a ride-on mower before (but have always fancied a go), ours has no gears and is easy to drive. We can give you a little training if needed! The more volunteers we have means mowing can be spread out and not become a regular commitment for one person.

The volunteers currently meet on Monday mornings but this is flexible and we can accommodate someone who can only make other times. A coffee break is standard and a good time for a social chat. If you'd like to know more, have a word or email me on -

JustGiving

Janet Wright writes...

Attending church on Sunday used to see children arriving clutching a 'penny' for the church plate (collection). Times have changed and that 'penny' is more likely to be a pound coin with adults contributing 'notes'.

Occasional visitors to church may wonder why the regular congregation do not seem to be putting a contribution in the 'Offertory (collection) Plate' or are putting in a small card instead. This is not because the regular congregation are not supporting the church, quite the opposite. Most of the congregation now donate to church by 'Standing Order' or 'Bank Transfer'. This is easier for the congregation who don't have to think about the offertory each Sunday and for the volunteers who manage church finances as they don't have to bank as much money. 'Win, Win' as the saying goes.

Occasional visitor to church are just like the rest of us and don't carry much cash these days. The passing of an offertory plate during the service can then become an embarrassment. Not a situation the church wishes to cause. So **JustGiving** or **JustTextGiving** may offer a solution if people would like to make a donation but don't carry any cash.

There are many parishioners who don't wish to attend church each week but feel a strong family link with the building where family members were baptised or married, where funerals were held and where ancestors may be buried in the churchyard. St Laurence Church is the listed Grade 11* parish church for Alvechurch. The money collected weekly from the congregation is used for the weekly running of the church (to ensure utility bills are paid and regular maintenance takes place), and for the maintenance of its mission and ministry. But the contributions made by the regular congregation can't cover the great cost of repairing years of the effects of weather and erosion on this historic building not to mention Victorian design faults.

St Laurence Church has set up a **JustGiving** account and a **JustTextGiving** account so anyone who wishes to help preserve their parish church for future generations can make a donation towards the cost of restoration. The first phase include restoration of the beautiful 'Stained Glass Windows'. This work is to be supported by the National Heritage Lottery Fund but the grant needs to be matched by donations. Please support your parish church by supporting fund raising events or by making a JustGiving donation (Gift Aided if you are a UK tax payer).

JustGiving donations can be made on the **JustGiving** charity page for 'Alvechurch PCC' or **JustTextGiving** text ASTL18 and the amount to 70070.

Thanks for your support and keep an eye on how the money is being used once the work can begin.

Centenary of Women's Suffrage

We take for granted our right to vote in national and local elections, whether we choose to exercise our democratic right or not. A hundred years ago, only property-owning men could do this.

The Representation of the People Act of 1918 enabled all men over twenty-one, and 8.5 million of the 15 million women of Britain to vote, as long as they were over the age of thirty and owned property. Full parity for women came only in 1928. Many people think that the campaign for women's right to vote began with the suffragettes of the 20th century, but it began much earlier. Groups of women and men lobbied Parliament, spoke at public meetings, and raised awareness of injustice throughout the 19th century.

One such group was the Church League for Women's Suffrage. The Worcester branch was led by a Cathedral Canon, James Maurice Wilson, who ran meetings from his home with his wife, Georgina. The Dean of Worcester, William Moore Ede, and his wife, Sarah, were also active members, as was the Bishop.

The Church League shunned violent protest, but, by connecting equality with Christian principle, added to the tide of opinion that made the 1918 Act inevitable.

O God, the light of the nations,

we thank you for all who strive for justice and challenge our complacency.

Grant that we may use our voices and our votes for the good of all people,

and that our faithfulness to your all-embracing love may be known

not just in our words, but also in our deeds.

Through Jesus Christ, our hope and salvation. Amen.

Stop Loan Sharks

In May, the Diocesan Modern Day Slavery conference in Wordsley heard something about the dangers of illegal money lending. It is one of the ways in which some people can get trapped in slavery. It is also just as easy to hide as other slavery related crimes, but some simple awareness and a willingness to report it, can make all the difference and change people's lives.

A loan shark is someone who lends cash as an unauthorised business and they are not always easy to spot. They will at first appear friendly, just part of the community, but when you cannot pay, they will turn on you.

A loan shark will often resort to threats, violence and intimidation, even if the debt has been paid off several times over. They will typically have little paperwork and, will add penalty charges for late payments. Sometimes they will add random sums to the bill.

Many victims keep paying because they think they can afford the agreed weekly sum, but they do not realise how much their continuing weekly payments add up to or they are to afraid to stop payments.

Mike's Story

Aged 17, Mike was keen to buy his first car. When Peter offered to lend him £250, Mike agreed and began paying back in instalments until the loan was repaid. It was only then that Peter mentioned additional interest; Mike wasn't expecting this and found it difficult to repay, so Peter offered him a further loan to pay off the first.

This became a cycle and continued over the next two decades. Mike was trapped in a never ending spiral of debt, and struggled to get by, despite working two jobs. He would make large repayments but his outstanding balance would never drop below £9000. Over the years Mike paid a staggering £90,000 to the loan shark, all from an initial loan of £250.

On more than one occasion, Mike attempted suicide.

"You wouldn't wish it on anybody" he said "It affected my relationship with my wife. If I wasn't at work, I was home arguing, and it affected the kids. They had nothing. Every Friday and Saturday he was sat outside my work. It was a living nightmare."

The turning point was when Mike spotted an article in his local paper about a loan shark who had been prosecuted by the Team. Peter was now threatening to harm Mike's wife and realising he could not take any more Mike called the confidential hotline.

From that point forwards he was supported and Peter was prosecuted and imprisoned.

"I wish I'd known there was somewhere to go years ago," Mike said. "The Team were fantastic, they offered so much support, and delivered on every promise they made. It was such a relief when I found out Peter was arrested and then put in prison. I would tell anyone who is borrowing from a loan shark to be confident to stand up and speak out- the Team will support you the whole way. Even a year later the Team are always there for me, regularly in touch and always on the end of the phone."

This short section is a brief "catch up slot" with some of the interesting faith news over the last few months.
